at the Texas Republican Headquarters in Austin filing paperwork to get on the March ballot.

"I chose to run because I heard Mike Conaway was retiring and I was raised by a mom who always told me that if I saw a problem that I needed to get up and be a part of the solution instead of just complaining about it," she said. Breyman sees several issues in the present political climate that raise concern. That includes wasting taxpayer money in an impeachment effort of President Trump,

she feels. Partisan politics are also an issue, Breyman believes.

"The problem I see is in the U.S. House and the inability to pass legislation that will benefit the people of America," she noted. "It is the duty of Congress to uphold the Constitution and its well-defined freedoms through the amendments.

"Congress has the right to tax the people, but no right to burden the people by squandering tax dollars on endless attempts to impeach a fairly elected President," she added. "I

am committed to being accountable to the people as a U.S. Representative."

Breyman is a former public school teacher and she co-owned two small businesses. She obtained a college degree while serving on the Forsan ISD School Board.

For the past 14 years, she's been a shareholder in the National Bank of Andrews and was elected to the board in 2006. She said the position has required her to obtain many hours of annual training with the Office of Comptroller of Currency and

with trade organizations.

"That training keeps me apprised of changing laws and regulations brought about by Congress," she noted.

Breyman said she desires to accomplish several goals if elected to Congress. One ambition is to work with colleagues to assure 1st and 2nd Amendment rights are upheld by Congress.

"I feel they are being threatened in areas such as Freedom of Speech, Religion and to keep and bear arms," she explained. Breyman also supports

a pro-life stance, she said. She is a mother of four children (one died in a car wreck in 2012) and a grandmother of eight.

"I want to protect the lives of unborn and innocent children," Breyman said. "I know Congress cannot legislate morals, but we can be a good example of 'doing unto others as you would have them do unto you.'"

Other ambitions include keeping taxes low and promoting small business, working with other Representatives to "break the barriers of partisan

politics and get back to solving real problems like mental health care and pharmaceutical cost in healthcare."

Breyman also believes safety in America is an issue.

"We need logical and attainable solutions best brought about by forming local subcommittees for public input and ideas," she said. Breyman said she wants to offer "my time and talents to help this country stay on the path to prosperity, growth and compassion to those who need our help."

heavy situation that had to be dealt with promptly."

At an Oct. 8 meeting, the school board voted 6-0 to propose terminating Ragland's contract, along with suspending him without pay.

Azam said following the meeting that Ragland had 15 days after the board action to appeal the contract termination proposal.

When no appeal was made by Ragland, the board officially took action with contract termination Tuesday.

Ragland, who was arrested by local police and booked into the county jail Sept. 30, was released to the U.S. Marshals Service in October on a federal agency detainer.

As of mid-October, the Andrews Police Department was still conducting an active investigation into Ragland with assistance from the Texas Rangers and U.S. Secret Service under the guidance of the Assistant U.S. Attorney's Office in Midland.

"Somewhere an innocent child has been victimized to produce these images and the Assistant U.S. Attorney aggressively pursues child pornography offenses," police said.

Federal court hearings will follow the indictments handed down on Oct. 23.

The federal complaint against Ragland based on the police department investigation revealed Ragland admitted to crimes of viewing child pornography and inappropriately touching students, accord-

ing to authorities.

During the investigation, Ragland admitted to officers that he accessed child pornography on a daily basis from the school laptop, investigators said. He also told investigators that he inappropriately touched at least three children and others as well, they added in the affidavit.

Furthermore, Ragland told police he was actually guilty of an accusation of inappropriately touching a student from 2006. That incident was investigated

but deemed unfounded.

In the affidavit, Ragland told investigators he wrote an apology letter to the student.

The school district's technology department in late September received reports of multiple attempts at pornography searches from Ragland's district-issued laptop, school officials said of the initial insight into the alleged crime.

Ragland was "immediately removed" from the classroom Sept. 30 after

the school district's web security filtering blocked pornographic searches by Ragland on his school laptop, according to a school district press release.

"The district immediately removed Mr. Ragland and contacted the Andrews Police Department," the press release stated.

Police then began an investigation that turned up "child pornography on one of Ragland's electronic devices," according to a police department press release.

ment at Medical Center Hospital in Odessa that day. While Muniz was at the appointment, Cardenas was in a truck in the parking lot with the infant's young daughter.

At that time, the infant apparently sustained injuries related to abuse that claimed its life, according to court proceedings. Following the incident, Cardenas apparently informed a valet at the hospital that the infant's skin was purple in color,

revealing lack of oxygen. They rushed the infant inside the hospital.

Police said "an unresponsive infant was taken into Medical Center Hospital where life saving measures were attempted." The infant was later flown to Cook Children's Medical Center in Fort Worth, where the infant was pronounced dead.

Medical examiners and personnel said during the trial that the infant died from blunt force trauma

(to the head), but also had other injuries that included a broken leg, several broken ribs and a detached retina.

Cardenas didn't testify in the interview he gave to law enforcement officers was played for jurors. In the interview, Cardenas said that he "may have shaken" the infant.

The blunt force trauma could've occurred with the infant's head hitting against a surface or object while being shaken, inves-

tigators believed.

A doctor who testified said that, though the twins were born prematurely, no medical condition could've caused the injuries that resulted in the infant's dire condition resulting from blunt force trauma appeared immediately and could not have manifested from an incident before they arrived at the hospital for Muniz's doctor's

appointment.

Medical records did reveal that the broken ribs sustained by the infant who died had occurred at least a week before.

Postal told jurors that Cardenas perhaps could've injured the infant while attempting resuscitation measures from another health condition or the infant possibly had other health issues.

Mason argued that since Cardenas has been in custody, the surviving twin hasn't sustained any

according to AEC spokesman Tim Gannaway.

The group was issued two blank petitions on Oct. 2 and has until around early December to collect signatures. In late September, the AEC filed a petition with Andrews County Elections Administrator Gracie Mendoza to circulate petitions for alcohol option elections involving the "legal sale of all alcoholic beverages including mixed beverages" and "for beer and wine" in the county.

The required 10 signatures for the petitions to be issued were validated and both petitions were issued. But the group was far from its signature target, recently, according to Gannaway.

"I haven't been able to check lately," he said Friday afternoon. "But we weren't anywhere near our goal a couple of weeks ago."

"The deadline is coming up either just before or after Thanksgiving," he added. "I don't believe we will reach the required number of signatures."

"At this point, I think it's safe to say that Andrews will not have an expanded alcohol option on the ballot in 2020."

The option for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages would allow bars and liquor stores to open in the county—which dif-

fers from the options that were narrowly approved in a city election in 2013 to make Andrews wet for the first time.

The AEC stated that the "group aims to open more land for development and encourage new business to open in the community" with its recent push. Gannaway said last month the group doesn't plan to hire outside consultants to campaign the petitions this go-around—unlike last time when they were used.

"It is being handled in-house by Andrews Expansion Council members," he explained.

One ambition with the recent petition effort is to do away with the ban on alcohol at the Andrews County Expo Arena, Gannaway noted.

Andrews County had been dry until 2013, when supporters of alcohol sales inside the city limits notched a slight victory with two referendums on the November General Election ballot.

Public Meeting Notice 2019-2022 Rural Transportation Improvement Program Revision

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will conduct a public meeting at the following time, date, and location:

The purpose of this meeting is to present proposed revisions to the FY 2019-2022 Rural Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for the Odessa District and to receive input from the public on the revisions. The Odessa District includes Andrews, Crane, Ector, Loving, Martin, Midland, Pecos, Reeves, Terrell, Upton, Ward, and Winkler counties.

The TIP is a mechanism used by TxDOT and FHWA to fund projects for the next four years and includes all federally funded projects. This meeting is being held pursuant to Title 43, Texas Administrative Code, Section 16.102, which calls for an opportunity for public comment concerning the program.

The proposed TIP Revision includes the addition of a project on SH 302 near Kermit, Winkler County, Texas. The proposed project would widen SH 302 to add an additional travel lane in each direction, from 1.0 mile west of SH 115 to 1.0 mile east of SH 115. The proposed project would also add eastbound and westbound frontage roads, each consisting of one travel lane. Improvements would also include the construction of two overpasses, one at SH 115 and one at the Texas & New Mexico Railroad. No new right of way is proposed for this project, therefore there would be no displacements.

The meeting will be held in an open house format, and TxDOT staff will be available to answer questions.

Persons interested in attending the meeting who have special communication or accommodation needs are encouraged to contact the district public information officer, Gene Powell, at 432-498-4746 or gene.powell@txdot.gov, at least two days prior to the meeting. Because the public meeting will be conducted in English, any requests for language interpreters or other special communication needs should also be made at least two days prior to the public meeting. TxDOT will make every reasonable effort to accommodate these needs.

The purpose of this meeting is to present proposed revisions to the FY 2019-2022 Rural Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for the Odessa District and to receive input from the public on the revisions. The Odessa District includes Andrews, Crane, Ector, Loving, Martin, Midland, Pecos, Reeves, Terrell, Upton, Ward, and Winkler counties.

The TIP is a mechanism used by TxDOT and FHWA to fund projects for the next four years and includes all federally funded projects. This meeting is being held pursuant to Title 43, Texas Administrative Code, Section 16.102, which calls for an opportunity for public comment concerning the program.

The proposed TIP Revision includes the addition of a project on SH 302 near Kermit, Winkler County, Texas. The proposed project would widen SH 302 to add an additional travel lane in each direction, from 1.0 mile west of SH 115 to 1.0 mile east of SH 115. The proposed project would also add eastbound and westbound frontage roads, each consisting of one travel lane. Improvements would also include the construction of two overpasses, one at SH 115 and one at the Texas & New Mexico Railroad. No new right of way is proposed for this project, therefore there would be no displacements.

The meeting will be held in an open house format, and TxDOT staff will be available to answer questions.

Persons interested in attending the meeting who have special communication or accommodation needs are encouraged to contact the district public information officer, Gene Powell, at 432-498-4746 or gene.powell@txdot.gov, at least two days prior to the meeting. Take Greater Control of Your 401(k)

If your employer offers a 401(k) or similar plan, you've got a powerful retirement-savings tool at your disposal. And yet, how well you do with your 401(k) depends greatly on your choices and actions. What steps can you take to maximize the benefits of your plan?

For starters, be aware that your 401(k) may come with what might be called "standard" features, which you should review to determine their applicability to your situation. These features include the following:

Default deferral rate - When you take a job, your employer may automatically enroll you in the company's 401(k) plan and assign a "default" contribution rate - the percentage of your salary you will put in to your 401(k). Many companies choose a default rate of 3 percent, although, in recent years, there has been a move toward higher rates, even up to 6 percent. Unfortunately, too many people don't question their default rate, which could be a problem, especially if it's at the lower end. If you want your 401(k) to ultimately provide you with as many financial resources as possible, you will likely need to contribute at much as you can afford. So, be aware of your default rate, and, if you can possibly afford it, increase that level. And every time your salary goes up, consider boosting your contributions.

Investment mix - When you're automatically enrolled in your 401(k), the amount you might initially contribute isn't the only "out of the shelf" feature - you also might be assigned a default investment option. One common default investment is known as a target-date fund, which generally includes a mix of stocks, bonds and cash instruments. Your 401(k) plan provider, or your human resources area, will typically base this mix on your age and projected retirement data. Usually, this fund will grow more conservative over time, reflecting the need to reduce the portfolio's risk as you get nearer to retirement. However, you may not be obligated to stick with the default option. Most 401(k) plans usually offer several options from which to choose. Ideally, you'd want to spread your investment dollars among a mix of these investments to give yourself the greatest growth potential, given your risk tolerance and time horizon. And always keep in mind that your 401(k) is a long-term vehicle, designed to help you prepare for a retirement that may be decades away. Consequently, try to discipline yourself to look past the inevitable short-term drops in your portfolio.

Matching contributions - If your employer offers a 401(k) matching contribution, you should certainly take advantage of it. Consider this: If your employer matches 50 cents for every dollar you contribute, up to 6 percent of your pay, and you contribute the full 6 percent, you would, in effect, be receiving a 3 percent pay raise (50 percent of 6 percent). That's like a 50 percent rate of return even before you invest this added money.

Taking control of your 401(k) in the ways described above can help you go a long way toward getting the most from your plan - and, as a result, may help get you closer to supporting the retirement lifestyle you've envisioned.

Texas Drilling Permits and Completions Statistics for October 2019

The Railroad Commission of Texas (Commission) issued a total of 971 original drilling permits in October 2019 compared 1,149 in October 2018. The October 2019 total included 895 permits to drill new oil or gas wells, 13 to re-enter plugged well bores and 63 for re-completions of existing well bores. The breakdown of well types for those permits is 249 oil, 39 gas, 608 oil or gas, 61 injection, three service and 11 other permits.

In October 2019, Commission staff processed 537 oil, 117 gas, 29 injection and six other completions compared to 987 oil, 170 gas, 49 injection and seven other completions in October 2018. Total well completions processed for 2019 year to date are 7,763; down from 9,254 recorded during the same time period in 2018.

According to Baker Hughes Inc., the Texas rig count as of Nov.1 was 416, representing about 51 percent of all active rigs in the United States.

during the remainder of the first half.

The Red Devils would convert their own fourth down situation on their opening series, with Goodley running for 13 yards on a 4th-and-2 play near midfield. That would set up his first score of the night, also on a 13-yard run, four plays later.

Mendoza would then be dropped for a seven-yard loss on the Bears' next offensive play, leading to a 4th-and-13 pass by Carrasco to Gary Abraham that would be picked off by Benjamin Rios, who worked his way across the field and then down the left sideline for a 57-yard touchdown to put the Red Devils ahead.

Rankin would then stop Balmorhea on downs on their next possession, but as the second quarter began the Bears would get their own defensive stop, as Angel Iniguez would sack Titan Quigg for an 11-yard loss and Balmorhea was then able to stop Rios short of a first down on a 4th-and-18 pass by Goodley. Taking over at their own 27, the Bears would get an interference call on Justin Rodriguez on a Kade Weatherman pass to Abraham, and a first down pass to Isaiah Valerio before Weatherman was able to find Carrasco on a 4th-and-12 pass for a 20-yard touchdown.

Both teams had the extra point kicks on their second TDs blocked, and the 14-1 tie would only 21 seconds, as Rodriguez would return Lauro Mata's kickoff to the Bears' 24 yard line, and Goodley would get around the right side of the defense to score on the next play.

Balmorhea would drive into Rankin territory on their next series, but this time, the Bears couldn't convert a 4th-and-1, as

Mendoza was stopped behind the line by Hayden Loftin, and one play later Quigg would find Rios behind the defense for a 49-yard touchdown pass. He then added the extra point for a 30-14 lead.

Down by 24 with 1:09 left in the half, the Bears would use all but one second of that to get back into the end zone. Mendoza would get outside for a 32-yard gain with 11 seconds to play. Carrasco would run the ball inside the 10 on the next play, and after the Bears used their final time out, Iniguez was able to dive into the end zone.

But Mata's kick again would be blocked, keeping the Red Devils' with a three-score lead, and on the first play after the kickoff in the third quarter Goodley would break through the line for a 65-yard touchdown, as Rankin's lead went to 46-20.

Balmorhea's opening series of the second half would end on downs, as Abraham couldn't hold onto a fourth down pass by Carrasco, but the Bears would then keep the Red Devils out of the end zone, stopping Quigg at their 24 on a fourth down pass by Goodley. Carrasco would get a first down and Rankin would be penalized for a facemask two plays later, setting up 14- and

10-yard runs by Mendoza, the last getting into the end zone.

The Bears then stopped the Red Devils on downs again late in the third period, as Mata sacked Goodley trying to pass on a 4th-and-8 play. Mendoza then ran for 23 yards to start the final period, and would get his fourth touchdown three plays after that, on a nine-yard run.

Mata's kick cut the margin to 46-36, but that would be the closest they could get. Quigg and Rios would connect on a 14-yard pass, and Rodriguez would run for 19 yards, before Goodley scored on a five-yard Weatherman and Carrasco then connected on a 31-yard pass, but a pass to Abraham near the goal line would be intercepted by Rios.

Goodley then saw his longest TD run of the night, 75 yards, wiped out by a holding call. But he then completed a 22-yard pass to Rios and would score from 39 yards out with 1:47 to play. Balmorhea answered back immediately with a 50-yard run for a score by Carrasco at the 1:28 mark, but Goodley then got his final TD on a 48-yard run with 1:17 left, and Rios then got his third interception of the night, picking off a Mendoza pass for Carrasco with 42 seconds to play.

Garden City won the District 8-A title on Friday with a 64-46 win over Sterling City. The 8-2 Bearkats faced the Bears in Balmorhea back on Sept. 13, and scored a 68-22 win. It will be the second year in a row the teams have faced each other in the post-season, with Garden City winning in 2018. The winner between the Bears and the Bearkats gets Borden County or Morton in the Region 2-A semifinals next week.

line at halftime, if we could just get him four yards, we're in good shape, because he was bouncing around in there like a little pinball sometimes to get to those four yards, but he runs hard."

Tony Armandariz's extra point tied the game, and the Eagles would then take advantage of two more Snyder penalties to force their first punt of the night, before starting an 81-yard scoring drive.

Granado would break through the line for a 49-yard run, on a play where he appeared to be stopped at the line, and Saldana would gain 17 yards on the next two carries to set up a one-yard TD by Velasquez.

That would begin a stretch of five touchdowns over the next five minutes, as Snyder would come back and re-tie the game, off a pass across the middle by Tavares to Williams that turned into a 43-yard score, before Pecos answered back on their next offensive play, with Saldana finding a hole on the left side for a 75 yard touchdown run.

That came 17 seconds after Williams' TD, but Tavares would then complete his 202-yard first half of passing, finding Dominguez on a 45-yard TD with 1:18 to play. The Eagles used a kickoff return by Ethan Orona to midfield to set up fourth TD of the quarter.

Four runs by Velasquez and Granado got the ball to the Tigers' 36 with 20.9 seconds left, when Velasquez took a snap out of the Wildcat and found Saldana open behind the Tigers front line. He would get the ball down to the Snyder 1 with 10.6 seconds left, and after using their final time out, Velasquez scored on a quarterback keeper for the 27-21 lead.

"We put on a couple of plays just to have them, just in case," Olson said of the pass play. "We pulled two of them out tonight, but we've still got two in the back pocket."

Snyder's first series of the second half started out like their first half series, with Tavares completing a couple of first down passes. But the Eagles would stop runs by Maverick Hernandez and

Samaniego, and after the Tigers weren't able to get Pecos to jump offside on a 4th-and-2 play, coach Wes Wood opted for a 29-yard Oliveras field goal, to cut Pecos' margin to three.

The Eagles would also start the second half the way they ended the first. Sean Castillo would gain 28 yards on a counter play, and Granado would break loose for 20-yards, down to the Tigers' 1, before scoring on the next play.

A high snap would cost Pecos a try for two points, and looked like it would give two to Snyder, as Williams scooped up the loose ball and raced 68 yards to the end zone. But an illegal block would wipe out the score keeping the Eagles' lead at nine.

Snyder's next series would end when Jose Garza broke through the line and forced Tavares into a 3rd-and-7 intentional grounding call.

"Defensively we had a couple of busts and a couple of communications errors, but we got those fixed," Olson said of the first half problems, adding there didn't make any adjustments at halftime. "We preach to our kids all the time about controlling what you can control, and in the first half we were doing some things a little out of our character, and not what we should be doing."

"We got those things fixed at halftime, not with any true adjustments, but just making sure we're doing what we're supposed to do, and the kids did a good job in the second half," he said.

The Eagles would take over at their own 37 on Oliveras' punt after the grounding call, and would survive a trio of holding calls, the second wiping out most of a 42-yard run by Velasquez. Granado would get a first down on a 16-yard gain after that hold, and Granado would convert a 4th-and-1 with a 13-yard run down to the Snyder 20.

Two plays into the final period, he would score from two yards out, and Velasquez then went in on the two-point conversion run for a 41-24 Pecos lead. Tavares would miss on his next two passes, and Williams would be dropped

for a five-yard loss to force another punt, and the Eagles then held the ball for the next 7 1/2 minutes before getting their final score of the night.

Granado would score from five yards out, after converting another 4th-and-1 with an eight-yard run. The final score would also give the senior his fourth 200-yard rushing night of the season, while the Eagles overall would finish with 441 yards rushing.

Snyder still managed to make the playoffs as the No. 3 seed, thanks to Sweetwater's 66-40 win at Monahans on Friday. That allowed the Mustangs to join the Eagles as the other 1-9 team from 2018 to qualify for the playoffs, while their win also ended Fort Stockton's 2019 season. Thanks to losses to both Snyder and Sweetwater, the 7-3 Panthers lost the three-way tiebreaker with the 4-6 Mustangs and the 3-7 Tigers for the final two playoff spots.

Fort Stockton ended their season with a 56-8 win over 0-10 Lamesa. The 10-0 Greenwood Rangers had the final bye week of the season, after clinching their second straight District 1-A Division II title. They'll face the Perryton Rangers in their bi-district playoff game on Thursday, while Sweetwater gets District 2-4A champ Lubbock Estacado and Snyder faces Dalhart in the other two playoff games this week. Both those games are scheduled for Friday night.

sent back from the United States. One woman hid in the bathroom with her daughter and called a local pastor for help; he tried to drive them away, but they were blocked by cartel members blocks way. The two were taken from the car and held by the gangsters, though they eventually were released unharmed.

A spokesperson for the Mexican foreign affairs secretary declined comment on allegations that Mexico cannot guarantee safety for immigrants returned from U.S.

U.S. Border Patrol officials said recently they are continuing to send asylum seekers back over the border, and that includes Nuevo Laredo. The number of people returned there has been reduced recently, but that was related to a said decrease in migrants arriving at the border — and not violence in Tamaulipas.

In an interview, Brian Hastings, Border Patrol chief of law enforcement operations, told AP that officials didn't see a "threat to that population" in Tamaulipas and "there was basically a small war between the cartel and the state police" there.

But the numbers indicate the danger is real. As of August, Human Rights First had tabulated 100 violent crimes against returnees. By October, after it rolled out to Tamaulipas, that had more than tripled to 340. Most involved kidnapping and extortion. Kizuka said the danger is even greater than the numbers reflect because they are based solely on accounts his organization or reporters have been able to document.

Of dozens of people interviewed by AP who said they had been victimized in Nuevo Laredo, Reynosa, Matamoros and Monterrey, just one had filed a police report.

Kidnappings of migrants are not a new phenomenon. According to Mexico's National Human Rights Com-

mission, in just six months in 2009 nearly 10,000 migrants were abducted while passing through the country.

Back then the cartels were splintering amid a government policy targeting their top bosses, leading them to fight among themselves in the people-smuggling business to fill two needs: money and labor. Kidnapped migrants generally were told they could avoid being killed by either paying ransom or working for the cartel.

Tamaulipas became a bloody emblem of the problem in 2010 when 72 migrants were found slain at a ranch in San Fernando, and a year later when the bodies of 193 migrants were found in the same area in clandestine mass graves — apparently murdered by a cartel to damage a rival's people-smuggling business.

Raymundo Ramos of the Nuevo Laredo Human Rights Committee said gangs today are more interested in squeezing cash from migrants. "They have to recover a lot of the money lost in those wars."

President Andrés Manuel López Obrador has acknowledged that another massacre or escalation of violence is a major fear and has deployed more than 25,000 troops and National Guard agents to police people-trafficking in border regions and along smuggling routes. But all the accounts of violence in this account took place after that deployment.

Reynosa, a factory city of about 650,000, is the largest in Tamaulipas and home to some of the worst drug war violence. It's also a key part of the migratory route and one of the busiest crossing points along with Ciudad Miguel Alemán.

Disputed by rival gangs, Reynosa has the feel of a place with invisible fences demarcating their territories, and numerous migrants said they had to pay to get past checkpoints at the main entrances to the city.

Lawyer and human rights

worker Fortino López Balcázar said the gangs first took control of the river, attacking and beating migrants. Then they started grabbing them from bus stations, and then from the streets.

The airport is also tightly controlled. A 46-year-old teacher from Havana recalled arriving with her 16-year-old son Aug. 13 by plane from Mexico City with the phone number for a taxi driver, provided by a lawyer who arranged their trip. As they drove into Reynosa, two other taxis cut the vehicle off. Two men got in, took away her cellphone and money and whisked them to a home that was under construction.

The lawyer "sold us out," the woman said.

That night they were moved to a thicket near the Rio Grande where they were held captive in an outdoor camp for a week with dozens of others. They met another group of Cubans, who were also abducted shortly after flying into Reynosa. Several taxi and vans brazenly intercepted them in broad daylight, bringing traffic to a halt.

"It was as if we were terrorists and the FBI had swooped down on us," one of the men said. He speculated they may have been betrayed by an airport immigration agent with whom they had argued over their travel documents.

López Obrador's government has said the National Immigration Institute is one of Mexico's most corrupt agencies. In early 2019 the institute announced the firing of more than 500 workers nationwide. According to a person with knowledge of the purge, Tamaulipas was one of four states where the most firings took place. Some worked in airports, others in the city of Reynosa.

In February the institute's deputy delegate to the city was fired and accused of charging detained migrants over \$3,000 to avoid deportation. Later new complaints surfaced of people being shaken down

for \$1,500 to be put at the top of wait lists to present claims in the United States.

At the riverside camp, the Cuban teacher was introduced to its "commander" who demanded "rent" and a fine for not traveling with a guide. The ransom was set at \$1,000.

Previously the Cuban woman's only exposure to the world of organized crime came from movies

she watched on the illegal satellite TV hookup that caused her to run afoul of authorities back home. Now they were witnessing things both terrifying and hard to understand.

There was the time a man tried to suffocate another with a plastic bag, or when the kidnappers, some barely in their teens, beat a "coyote" for working for a rival outfit. From what

she was able to understand from the shouting, he had been kidnapped along with clients he was guiding and they wanted him to switch loyalties.

The captors at the thicket referred to themselves as "the corporation," the teacher said. People came and went, some delivered by men in uniforms who may or may not have been police.

Lady Lobos look to change course with new coach

For the past five seasons, the Monahans Lady Lobos basketball program has endured its most trying time ever. Over that span, the team has lost over 100 games.

This year, Head Coach Victor Pallares inherits a program where the culture has been one of complacency rather than one of being competitive.

Pallares, in his first season in Monahans, hopes to begin the huge task of changing that with an emphasis on defense and conditioning along with taking the right shots.

It begins in a team's identity and mindset, according to Pallares. He emphasizes his team goal is to be D.E.A.D.-ly every night on the court.

"The first four letters have a

meaning," Pallares said.

The first letter is for dedication which includes being dedicated to what they are doing, to the program, to the team, to all around athletics and academics.

He said, "My goal is for each one of those girls is for them to be Academic All-State by the time they walk out of our program. That's where it starts. It takes time especially with a changing culture and higher expectations."

Energy is what the next letter focuses on and is how Pallares wants to see his players.

"I want them to enjoy playing," he said. "Being on the court bringing energy or being on the bench with a towel in your hand and waving it when a girl takes a charge or a big play."

The third letter is for attitude.

"It involves having the right attitude that we're going to go to work. We're going to be dedicated and make people out work us is something that we hope to instill in our players," Pallares said.

The fourth letter is defense. A key ingredient in any successful basketball program is the ability to play defense especially late in the game.

He said, "That's what we're going to be about. Defense is always there at the end of the night. You may be having a bad night on one end and the other you can go down and stay in ball games. There's going to be nights where we're going to have to put our hands in somebody's face and get after it. We still have a long way to go, but it's early and our defense is only going to get better."

Pallares arrives in Monahans from Sundown, where he was Assistant Head Coach for basketball for the past two seasons. Before his stint at Sundown, Pallares was the Girls Head Basketball Coach at Van Horn for three seasons.

The Lady Lobos will play teams from throughout the Permian Basin including tough opponents in Midland Christian, Odessa Permian, but also gain experience in playing teams from the Panhandle of Texas, where girls basketball is a hot bed of competition.

Pallares inherited a partially done schedule for his team, but managed to put in some games to get that much needed experience.

"Some of the schedule was already set," he said. "Some were already on there. Coming in, it is hard to find games so you have to look to have the opportunity to travel and play teams from out of this area like up north. I managed to get one of those for now (Littlefield) and hopefully down the road we can bulk up that schedule so we can play certain teams. If we're ever going to get tougher and better and compete in district and not just for third or fourth, but go after a district championship, we have to bulk up our schedule."

The team scrimmaged Midland Lee, which proved to be a daunting task. Their tournament schedule includes the O.W. Follis Tournament in Lamesa, the Hootown Tournament in Stanton, and the Wildcat Classic in Littlefield.

Last year, the program only won eight games and failed to make the playoffs.

Returning from last year's squad is guard Taegan Noyola, who has played experience from two seasons ago and would love nothing more than to finish her senior year with a good run in district play and into the postseason.

Daisy Venegas, who has been impressive defensively and shooting early on, is returning for her senior year.

Adriana Hernandez, who was moved up to varsity at district last year, was impressive offensively last year and in crashing the boards on defense.

Vangie Primera, a junior, will provide another steady hand entering her third season on varsity.

Sophomore D'Andrea Smith, who gained varsity experience last season as a freshman, will provide quality minutes and leadership on the floor from the backcourt along with Noyola.

Absent from this year's squad is Taryn Griner. The dual sport athlete in basketball and swimming last year has opted to concentrate only on swimming and will not be on the hardwood floor this season.

After playing on the road this Saturday against Alpine at 12:30, the Lady Lobos return home on Tuesday as they host Snyder at 6 p.m.

Hospital to assist school with physical therapy

Ward Memorial Board of Managers approved an agreement with MWISD to provide physical therapy services and entered into a contract with On Demand Leadership during last Thursday's regular meeting.

Based on the approved agreement with Monahans-Wickett-Pyote ISD, the Physical Therapy Department of the hospital will provide physical therapy services for Special Education Students. The hospital, according to the agreement, will serve as an "Independent Contractor to perform any and all Physical Therapy Services as required by Monahans Wickett Pyote ISD. Independent Contractor also agrees to provide a

monthly update of services and activities offered to each student during the month."

Fees for the services be \$75 per session and \$125 for the initial consultation. The hospital will provide Individual Education Plans (IEPs) for physical therapy and provide reports towards goals to MPWISD.

Hospital CEO Leticia Rodriguez said it is expected that treatments for three to five students at any given time will receive service.

Managers present for the meeting were John Fausett, Larry Hunt, Gerald Carlson, Jeff Burdic, Lisa Stewart, Frank Heslin, Angel Fuentes and Tommy Escamilla.

In other actions, the Managers approved a contract with

On Demand Leadership (ODL) to provide leadership development for hospital staff members. ODL, a Houston based company, will provide leader training programs such as Group Training Classes, one-on-one coaching, organizational and individual assessments and group facilitation and problem-solving session.

Cost of the session is \$83,542 per year. The agreement, if not meeting expectations, can be cancelled after six months.

The Managers also approved transferring Private Pay collections to HRRG from TruBridge. All other collection activities will remain with TruBridge. The collection fees will range from eight to 18 percent, depending on the age of the account. Under 45 days will be eight percent, 45-90 will be 10.25 percent, 90 to 120 days will be 10.5 percent, 121 to 150 days will be 12 percent, 151 to 365 days will be 15 percent and anything over 366 will be 25 percent.

The current collection rate for TruBridge is 12 percent.

HRRG also provides customer options such as a payment portal, pay by phone, email re-

mindes, paperless billing and text messaging. Noting that TruBridge has issues at times, Rodriguez said, "If they do a good job on this, we may consider moving other collection activities to them. We don't want to move everything all at once."

Payment of bills totaling \$722,791 was approved. According to the report presented by CFO Judy Espitia, leading items were Payroll Nov. 1 - \$279,286; Employee Insurance - \$117,544; Employee Retirement - \$73,125 and Medicare Reimbursement - \$28,513.

Cash as of Nov. 6 was \$7.66 million and year-to-date collections were \$12,675,158. Also included is a \$1 million transfer from Ward County.

Approved budget amendments were \$35,000 for Sundry revenue to cover expense items of License/Fees of \$7,000 and Medicare Payment of \$28,000.

The only approved personnel change was transferring Ana Diaz from part-time employment to full time in the Dietary department at a salary of \$13 per hour.

The Managers also approved the QAPI (Quality Assurance, Performance Improvement) for the third quarter 2019 report. Rodriguez said, "We have never had this may 100 percent grades in so many areas. We are definitely moving in the right direction."

A few discrepancies were noted. In the Business Office, Registration Admissions Accuracy was 80 percent which can be improved by a policy review with the staff. A low score in Swing Bed Activity Assessment was rated at 12 percent. The hospital currently has one contracted Activity Director to perform activity screenings. In the Trauma area, a score of 40 percent was noted for ED time of two hours. Corrective action was listed as "Bringing together an inter-professional team involved in the process and do process mapping on order to better streamline process."

In reviewing the renovations for the Physical Therapy Clinic, Rodriguez said, "With the holidays coming up, it is not a good time to solicit bids. We will likely start the bidding process early year."

In routine matters, minutes of the October 24 meeting were approved.

westbound on I-20 when Wilbanks said Logan-Padilla failed to control speed and struck the trailer, causing it and the cab of his truck to catch fire. Local firefighters and Ward County EMS and sheriff's deputies also were called to the scene, and the crash would close I-20 between Pyote and the Frontage Road exit for several hours.

Zapata-Mata was not injured in the crash. Along with Wilbanks, the crash was investigated by DPS troopers Leonel Pizano, Kody Gayle, Cullen Rich and Daniel Leyva of Monahans and Domenick Puricelli of Odessa.

Wilbanks was also lead investigator on the second crash, which happened at 12:04 a.m. on Nov. 1 at mile marker 70, between Wickett and Pyote in Ward County. In that crash, he said a 2006 Infinity G35 driven by William Jaden Foster, 20, of Southaven, Miss., was westbound at a high rate of speed when he lost control of his

vehicle and entered the center median of I-20, before going into a broadside skid, crossing the eastbound lanes and striking a concrete barrier at the Spur 65 overpass.

Foster was transported to Medical Center Hospital in Odessa with incapacitating injuries. Killed was a passenger in his vehicle, identified as Edwin Gonzalez, 18, of Byhalia, Miss. He was pronounced dead by JP Polanco and his body taken to Harkey Funeral Home. The crash forced the closure of the eastbound right lane of I-20 for several days while inspections and repairs could be made to the overpass and its support column.

Along with Wilbanks, Pizano, Gayle, Rich, Leyva and Ofelia Flores of Pecos were the assisting DPS troopers. Ward County Sheriff's Deputies and Texas Department of Transportation workers also worked the accident scene.

"There's going to be a lot of team bonding for sure. It will just be different, a really cool privilege that we


